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## General Marking Guidance

- All candidates must receive the same treatment. Examiners must mark the first candidate in exactly the same way as they mark the last.
- Mark schemes should be applied positively. Candidates must be rewarded for what they have shown they can do rather than penalised for omissions.
- Examiners should mark according to the mark scheme not according to their perception of where the grade boundaries may lie.
- There is no ceiling on achievement. All marks on the mark scheme should be used appropriately.
- All the marks on the mark scheme are designed to be awarded. Examiners should always award full marks if deserved, i.e. if the answer matches the mark scheme. Examiners should also be prepared to award zero marks if the candidate's response is not worthy of credit according to the mark scheme.
- Where some judgement is required, mark schemes will provide the principles by which marks will be awarded and exemplification may be limited.
- When examiners are in doubt regarding the application of the mark scheme to a candidate's response, the team leader must be consulted.
- Crossed out work should be marked UNLESS the candidate has replaced it with an alternative response.

2(c)	<p>Answers are more likely to be two separate statements about pressure groups and political parties rather than one or more statements identifying the difference.</p> <p>1 mark for a correct statement about each (maximum 2):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A pressure group represents the interests of a group of people</li> <li>• A pressure group represents a single interest/issue/topic</li> <li>• A pressure group attempts to influence the policy/policies of a political party or the government</li> <li>• A political party represents a lot of different interests/aims</li> <li>• A political party represents the interests of the whole country</li> <li>• A political party wants to get MPs elected</li> <li>• A political party wants to form, or become, the government</li> </ul>	(2)

2(h)(i)	1 mark for each separately identifiable point (maximum 2): <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A government formed by more than one party OR (two) parties share power/have a majority OR (two) parties work together/in partnership to run the country/government</li> <li>• A government where no one party has an overall majority (of MPs/seats) /no one party is the clear winner</li> <li>• The government is formed by the Conservatives and Liberal Democrats</li> <li>• The parties must agree, or compromise, or reach a consensus on policies</li> </ul>	(2)

3(c)(ii)	<p>1 mark for the following - any relevant example concerning the use/conservation/management/protection/replacement/preservation of natural resources, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• using renewable energy sources OR not using up finite energy sources such as oil</li> <li>• conserving fish stocks/protect wildlife</li> <li>• replanting trees after others are cut down/stop cutting down trees</li> <li>• better land use</li> </ul>	(1)

3(d)	<p>1 mark for any of the following (maximum 2):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• reduce the amount of paper used</li> <li>• recycle more material</li> <li>• discourage car travel OR encourage people to walk or cycle OR car share OR use public transport</li> <li>• install solar panels (or other type of specified realistic renewable energy) OR a realistic form of energy conservation, eg. turn off appliances when not in use</li> <li>• conserve water by collecting rainwater for gardens/parks</li> <li>• plant more trees</li> </ul> <p>0 marks for 'raising awareness'.</p>	(2)

3(f)	<p>1 mark for any of the following (maximum 2):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• give subsidies to (West African) farmers OR reduce subsidies paid to EU farmers/producers</li> <li>• invest in projects or economic development</li> <li>• MEDCs buy(import) more products from LEDCs/poorer countries</li> <li>• MEDCs reduce tariffs or taxes on imports from LEDCs /poorer countries</li> <li>• Any relevant reference to the use or adoption of fair trade</li> <li>• Give aid/money to them for a particular purpose (eg. investment or more production), not just 'aid' or 'money'</li> </ul>	(2)

<p><b>4</b> <b>QWC i-ii-iii</b></p>	<p><b>Title</b> 'Freedom of speech must be limited as it leads to hatred and violence.'</p> <p><b>Indicative content</b> Indicative content should always be considered in relation to mark scheme level descriptors.</p> <p><b>Agree</b> Some religious leaders have denounced the beliefs of others and those opposed to their views have argued for punishment. Examples may be given here with reference to religious and/or political groups or sects within those groups, some contemporary, others historical. Freedom of speech in the media has allowed 'name and shame' campaigns to take place, which have caused false allegations of suspected sex offenders.</p> <p><b>Disagree</b> Such principles as democracy and community cohesion require tolerance of those who have different values and beliefs, whether based on religion or culture. Freedom of speech does not extend to offending others or denying them their rights. Restricting freedom of speech could lead to oppression. Freedom of speech is necessary in a democratic society to allow scrutiny of those in power. It would be unfair to punish everyone by restricting freedom of speech when only a minority abuse this right. Limiting freedom of speech could prevent heroes like Martin Luther King and Gandhi from speaking out and changing the course of history. Less freedom of speech may lead to more violence and hatred if people cannot speak out about their problems.</p> <p>(1) Accept any other suitable content. If criminals are locked away then they cannot commit crime. Criminals should be punished.</p> <p><b>Disagree</b> Prisons are often perceived as places where criminals learn more about crime Many criminals will re-offend when they come out of prison. Other forms of punishment may be more effective, such as community service, rehabilitation, restorative justice, ASBOs. Criminals need education- many commit crimes because of social, economic or educational disadvantages.</p> <p>(1) Accept any other suitable content. <p>6 QWC i-ii-iii</p>	<p><b>Title</b> 'At a time of economic difficulty, we must not expect the government to meet all our needs.'</p> <p><b>Indicative content</b> Indicative content should always be considered in relation to mark scheme level descriptors.</p> <p><b>Agree</b> If we don't look after ourselves then nobody else will. We are each responsible for our own economic welfare. We must be prepared to be flexible and learn new skills to help us to adapt to change. Too much government help could harm the country's road to recovery. High unemployment means the government cannot afford to help everyone because less income tax is coming in, and so they must focus on the most needy. Some people cheat the system so it would be unfair to offer them the same help.</p> <p><b>Disagree</b> We didn't create the economic difficulties so we can't be expected to solve them, others must do this. We look to government in times of difficulties. The role of the government or state is to protect the weak and vulnerable. The rich can look after themselves because they have the money to do so, but the poor can't so need the government's help. Everyone who works pays taxes so should be entitled to government help because they have contributed towards paying for this help. It might not be your fault that you need help eg. you have been made redundant or are disabled and cannot work. The government could provide the help needed by prioritising their spending differently eg. spending less on defence.</p> <p>(1) Accept any other suitable content.
